
This edition contains a feature on the book wishlist scheme that has been launched by the PTFA. Take a look at the joy your kind donations are already bringing to our young readers!


We read The Naughty Bus then looked at non-fiction texts about Tous. The children really enjoyed finding out about when toys were made and what they were made of.


We also looked at how non-fiction books (Start up history: toys) were set out with headings, pictures and photographs.

Everyone was really proud of their information pages and commented on how much they enjoyed creating them.






We rehearsed our poems aloud using rhythm and counting syllables to make sure the patterns were right.


Lauma's poem includes alliteration with a 'fluffy fox'. She has also used lots of adjectives to improve description so that the reader can really picture what the fox looks like.





Her poem has all the elements we learnt about including rhyme, rhythm, alliteration, and she's even used apostrophes correctly!



Charlie wrote his own verses for this hymn that followed the structure well.




