

Our favourite authors become such effective writers because they love to read, so this edition of the magazine is a celebration of all things books and reading!





Each sister was gifted a magical object with the power to change their fate and help them escape the life they have begun to despise.

Advertised as a spellbinding tale, this book does not disappoint! Brimming with adventure, dark magic, peril and sisterly squabbles meant I couldn't put this book down. Gripping from the very start, this book is a must read!



Greedy zebra is a story that I have read to all my classes and it is one of my favourites. It is a story about how all the animals chose their own clothing to make them look like they do as we know them.



Mwenye Hadithi brilliantly describes how the animals discover a magical cave of furs and how they exchange their dull grey skins for beautiful new ones. Greedy Zebra lives up to his name by arriving late to the cave because he cannot resist the temptation of the juicy grass on the way. As he enters the cave all that is left is a plain black piece of cloth that he has to try and squeeze into.

This story has beautiful illustrations that capture the characters of the animals. It is a book that both adults and children will enjoy to the very end. You will always find this story in my book corner and it has been read over and over again.

The book I have chosen to review for you is one that particularly sticks in my mind for sentimental reasons. It is Jim and the Beanstalk by Raymond Briggs.



Jim and the Beanstalk is written as a sequel to the traditional tale of Jack and the Beanstalk. The giant is much older and is not his original, fearsome self when Jim finds him after a long climb up a beanstalk. The giant has grown older and he needs Jim's help. This story has some lovely modern twists to hook in the readers. Although it is a picture book, Jim and the Beanstalk can be enjoyed by all primary aged children and adults. It sends an important message of being kind and taking care of others when they are not quite feeling themselves. It is important that children know the tale of Jack and the Beanstalk to get the most out of this story.

Fran could not help but sneak a read of this when she found it out on the side at home despite being a lot older than three now!

I really hope that you enjoy this story as much as we have.









Y3 & Y4




This book is the first in the Gormy Ruckles series and, for those of you in Year Four who read Skeleton Keys in the autumn term, this is brought to you by the same author!

When a baby escapes a murderer intent on killing the entire family, who would have thought it would find safety and security in the local graveyard? Brought up by the resident ghosts, ghouls and spectres, Bod has an eccentric childhood learning about life from the dead. But for Bod there is also the danger of the murderer still looking for him - after all, he is the last remaining member of the family. A stunningly original novel deftly constructed over eight chapters, featuring every second year of Bod's life, from babyhood to adolescence. Will Bod survive to be a man?

Once there was Magic, and the Magic lived in the dark forests. *Until the Warriors came...* Xar is a Wizard boy who has no Magic, and will do anything to get it. Wish is a Warrior girl, but she owns a

banned Magical Object, and she will do anything to conceal it. In this whirlwind adventure, Xar and Wish must forget their differences if they're going to make it to the dungeons at Warrior Fort. Where something that has been sleeping for hundreds of years is stirring... This is a story about a boy named Kester. He is extraordinary, but he doesn't know that yet. All he knows, at this very moment, is this:

I. There is a flock of excited pigeons in his bedroom.

2. They are talking to him.

3. His life will never be quite the same again...

Kester lives in a land in quarantine. A deadly virus has killed all the animals except pests and it's expected to be equally dangerous to humans. But when Kester realises he can talk to the pests, he finds they have great hope invested in him.
